

# U-M Think Factory Will Lure

The University of Miami will establish a "thought factory" this summer — officially a "Center for Theoretical Studies" where scientists from all over the world can gather to compare notes and conduct research.

Dr. Behram Kursunoglu, pro-

fessor of physics, will serve as the center's director, said U-M President Henry King Stanford. Dr. Arnold Perlmutter, associate professor of physics, will act as coordinator.

The center will provide facilities for visiting scholars to work, write and confer with

colleagues, said Dr. Kursunoglu. They, in turn, will stimulate graduate students through formal and informal lectures, and may be invited to supervise graduate projects. Their visits may vary from a month to an entire academic year.

Among those who already

have agreed to visit the center are Dr. Willis E. Lamb, of Yale, a Nobel Laureate (1955), and Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer of the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton. More than a dozen others, chiefly in high energy physics, also are scheduled.

# World's Top Scientists

Although the initial emphasis is on physics, future visitors will include biology scientists, scientific historians and philosophers, chemists and mathematicians.

A 10-member scientific council is being formed to supervise the center's growth and recom-

mend appointments. Five U-M representatives and five internationally known scientists from elsewhere will make up the council.

Initial outside members will be Drs. Gerson Goldhaber, University of California; Morton

Hamermesh, Argonne National Laboratories, (Ill.); Yoichiro Nambu, University of Chicago; Robert E. Marshak, University of Rochester, and Julian Schwinger, Harvard. U-M members will be recommended in the fall by the Research Council.
